Year C Feast of the Epiphany

SUNDAY 6 Jan 2013

Like many of the most ancient Christian feasts, Epiphany was first celebrated in the East. Epiphany originally celebrated four different events, in the following order of importance: 1) the baptism of the Lord; 2) Christ's first miracle, the changing of water into wine at the wedding in Cana; 3) the Nativity of Christ; and 4) the visitation of the Wise Men or Magi. Eventually, the celebration of the Nativity was separated, in the West, into Christmas, and shortly after, Western Christians adopted the Eastern feast of the Epiphany. Thus, Epiphany came to mark the end of Christmastide – the Twelve Days of Christmas, which began with the revelation of Christ to Israel in His Birth and ended with the revelation of Christ to the Gentiles at Epiphany.

The story of the Magi travelling from the East to see the Christ child appears only in Matthew's Gospel. We think of there being three wise men because of the number of gifts, but Matthew doesn't tell us the exact number. Since the 3rd Century, Christian writers have referred to them as kings, even though Matthew doesn't specifically tell us that they were royalty.

We generally think of the young as those who are most willing to set off on a journey with little more than some money in their pocket. As we get older and wiser, we tend to plan more, take plenty of clothes, make reservations ahead of time, take credit or debit cards to augment the cash we might have. We probably go to Google to get detailed directions and information of our destinations – few of us would start off without a destination. Some of us might even pay a professional travel agent to help us plan our trip and make sure everything is in readiness. If this kind of planning is true for most of us humans, then the Magi in this Sunday's Gospel are strikingly different from us! They begin a long journey with no more map than a star, with no clear idea of a destination except Jerusalem (a rather big city to find such a tiny baby!), and only a vague idea of whom they are looking for ('newborn king of the Jews'). Moreover, there isn't much in the trip for them, they bring gifts for this 'newborn king; and return empty -handed.

The Magi's epiphany journey is the pattern of our Christian living: we follow God's promptings, seek God diligently, overcome many obstacles, and finally, finding God, we offer homage. Rather than gifts of things, we offer God the greatest gift we can – our very selves.

Two Interesting Workshops

Everything you always wanted to know about *THE GIRM* but were afraid to ask!!

The Missal has in the front of it an important document called the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* (GIRM). It is like a map that guides the celebration of Mass by explaining its structure and the various ministries, furnishings and other requisites involved. The *General Instruction* also articulates the doctrinal principles behind how Mass is celebrated and explains why we do the things we do.

The GIRM provides answers to many of the questions that people ask of Liturgy Brisbane, such as: Can white wine be used for the Eucharist? What is allowed on the altar during Mass? What is wrong with using hosts from the tabernacle for Communion? In addition, there are several key aspects in both the revised *General Instruction* and previous editions which have not yet been implemented fully.

It is vital that anyone involved in planning or celebrating liturgy, including presiders, pastoral associates, parish liturgy teams, APREs, those who plan school Masses and liturgical ministers, have a good understanding of this key liturgy document. To assist with this, Brisbane Liturgy is offering a session that outlines the broad content and key features of the *General Instruction*, highlights recent changes and explores the practical implementation of the principles and practices it espouses. **Wednesday 20 February** 9.30am to 3.30pm at Meeting Room, 50 Fairway Dve, Clear Island Waters (Surfers Parish).

Unfortunately there are a substantial number of people who are distractingly tardy, obviously disturbing fellow parishioners as they search for the often elusive seat.

Firstly, adding another 5 minutes to our pre-mass planning could be a great help. Secondly, if there is no way of avoiding being late, it would be preferred if late comers waited until the congregation is less occupied, say at the collection time, to find a seat.

While on the subject, staying in the Church until after the Final Blessing, shows great respect for the sacrament just celebrated and the people with whom we have shared that celebration.

A Great Lesson On Stress

A young lady confidently walked around the room while leading and explaining stress management to an audience with a raised glass of water. Everyone knew she was going to ask the ultimate question, 'half empty or half full?'... She fooled them all "How heavy is this glass of water?" she inquired with a smile. Answers called out ranged from 8 oz. to 20 oz. She replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long I hold it. If I hold it for a minute, that's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my right arm. If I hold it for a day, you'll have to call an ambulance. In each case it's the same weight, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes." She continued, "and that's the way it is with stress.

If we carry our burdens all the time, sooner or later, as the burden becomes increasingly heavy, we won't be able to carry on." "As with the glass of water, you have to put it down for a while and rest before holding it again. When we're refreshed, we can carry on with the burden - holding stress longer and better each time practiced. So, as early in the evening as you can, put all your burdens down. Don't carry them through the evening and into the night...


