FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT YEAR C

SUNDAY March 17 2013



We have a new Pope. My first thoughts.

Like many of you I was surprised, pleasantly so, to hear of the announcement of Pope Francis $1^{\rm st}$ in the early hours of Thursday morning.

When some of the excitement settled down I started to feel a sense of joyful hope about what this new leader of the universal Church might bring to our Catholic faith, which we must admit have been under a great deal of public scrutiny and conjecture in recent days. Some of the factors that caused my hopefulness were the fact that the new Pope, the 76-year old Argentinean Jesuit, Jorge Mario Bergoglio, comes from a strong Catholic country in a diverse continent, one which knows both the poverty and riches associated with modern living. He will be no stranger to the contemporary questions confronting society, and in his simple, yet astute, way he will think through the issues carefully and be decisive when required.

I was heartened to know that Pope Francis does his own cooking

(does that include shopping in the supermarket?) as well as taking public transport (does that include standing when the bus is crowded?), lives in a small apartment by himself (does that include doing laundry and vacuuming?), simple ordinary things which must keep him in contact with the simple ordinary things of people's everyday lives. If the Pope doesn't know how we live then it is difficult for him to know how to help us live better.

I was a little worried that at 76 years old he might find the weight of the office too heavy. Some of us 20 years younger have trouble keeping up with smaller local concerns. Still he has the greatest theological and administrative minds in the world to consult.

I think we all understand the symbolism of his taking of the name Francis, which should remind him, and us, to stay focussed on the goal of Christ: to be simple and child-like and not to store up earthy treasures.

I really like the fact that he comes from a Jesuit background, making him one who cannot ignore the need for justice at all levels of society, especially the poor, as well as having as his constant model, Saint Ignatius.

My greatest hope that he will be a listener, not just a talker. The voice of the God's people is increasing in volume and the noise is not always a contented one.

I think he will be courageous in the face of criticism, careful in the way he speaks to the 1.3 billion Catholics of the world, and wise in the way that he draws together the various cultures and ideologies of the Catholic faith.

Although we will most likely never meet each other, I hope Pope Francis will know that many thousands of priests and many millions of the laity will be working beside him to bring God's word alive.

RECEIVING COMMUNION IN OUR PARISH

We welcome all to our Parish and ask that you respect the local practice of receiving the Lord's Body and Blood.

- When the priest and ministers are in their customary place, move out of the pews starting from the front pew. Stand in line and walk up, do not skip people. During this time you should be preparing yourself to be handed the host.
- Approach the Eucharist with reverence, **bow** just before you reach the front of the line.
- The Body of Christ is received on the hand or on the tongue. The Blood of Christ is received by drinking from the chalice. We kindly ask you to refrain from dipping the host into the chalice.
- Listen to the priest as you approach to receive the Eucharist. He will hold it up and say "The Body of Christ" You respond with an "Amen" and make the Sign of the Cross as you move away from the priest.
- If you are receiving the Blood of Christ from the chalice the procedure is the same.
- You should swallow the host before you leave the Sanctuary, then return to your pew and pray until the priest is finished offering the Blessed Sacrament. Talk to God he is with you. You may say a number of prayers or pray in your own words.



This year our parish ceremonies on Palm Sunday will begin on the lawn under the trees near the car park at Mary Immaculate church. After the blessing of the palms, children from the Children's Liturgy groups will lead the procession of all parishioners into the church. Parishioners are invited to gather on the lawn and not in the church before 8.30am Mass on Palm Sunday.

THIS WEEKS SAINTS

Monday, March 18. St Patrick

Kidnapped from the British mainland around the age of 16, and shipped to Ireland as a slave. Sent to the mountains as a shepherd, he spent his time in prayer. After six years of this life, he had a dream in which he was commanded to return to Britain; seeing it as a sign, he escaped. He studied in several monasteries in Europe and was ordained. Then as a Bishop he was sent by Pope Saint Celestine to evangelize England, then Ireland. In 33 years he effectively converted Ireland. In the Middle Ages Ireland became known as the Land of Saints, and during the Dark Ages its monasteries were the great repositories of learning in Europe, all as a consequence of Patrick's ministry.

Tuesday, March 19. St Joseph husband of Mary

Descendant of the house of David, a carpenter, and earthly spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, foster father of Jesus Christ. A visionary who was visited by angels, Joseph was not noted for his willingness to immediately get up and do what God told him. Pope John Paul II describes him well: "Joseph is a man of great spirit. He is great in faith, not because he spoke his own words (scripture does not record even one word spoken by him), but above all because he listened to the word of the Living God. He listened in silence. And his heart ceaselessly preserves in the readiness to accept the Truth contained in the word of the Living God"


