**“Everyone gets a ribbon”?**

This time next week, Australia will have our next Prime Minister! We will have ticked the squares for our preferred candidates and may have stayed up late watching progressive results as commentators in the tally room announce winners and losers seat by seat!

Only one person will win in each Electoral Division. Only that one person will win the seat for their Electoral Division in the House of Representatives. Everyone doesn't get a ribbon in politics! Everyone doesn't get a ribbon in 'real-life'.

A few weeks ago, I read an article in a local paper about consequences of an “everyone gets a ribbon” culture. The article quoted Amanda Ripley, author of a new book *The Smartest Kids in the World and How They Got That Way*. Ms Ripley's research for the book explored how teenagers learn in top-performing countries. She intimated that the most successful students in those countries had not grown up in an “everyone gets a ribbon” culture. Rather those students had learnt resilience!

“The trick is that teaching kids to fail and then recover is easier when they are 10 than when they are 30, so if we don't teach them about resilience when they are younger we are not really helping them,” she said. Perhaps the same comments could be made of the quality of humility!

In today's gospel, Jesus recounts a parable of a wedding feast and exhorts His listeners: “do not take your set in the place of honour.” Rather Jesus exhorts His listeners: “when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there.” Surely Jesus was encouraging His listeners to develop humility and resilience.

What could those qualities mean for us as individuals today? What could those qualities mean for Australia as a nation? How could each of us develop our resilience in the midst of an “everyone gets a ribbon” culture?

Surely Jesus' teaching challenges the values of many people in our society where pride and prejudice often supplant humility and hospitality.

Surely Jesus' teaching challenges the values of many people who view any kind of failure as defeat rather than as a stepping stone to resilience. Because in 'real-life' everyone doesn't get a ribbon!

### **FEAST DAYS OF THE WEEK**

#### **Tuesday, September 3, St Gregory the Great, Pope**

St Gregory the Great was born in Rome, the son of a Roman Senator. He was Prefect (Mayor) of the city of Rome when he discerned a deep call and entered the monastery of St Andrew and became abbot. The Pope sent him on a diplomatic mission to Constantinople where he remained for five years. Upon the death of the pope, Gregory was elected to succeed him, the first monk ever elected as the Successor of Peter. Gregory exercised a momentous influence on the doctrine, the organization, and the discipline of the Catholic Church. If no account were taken of his work, the evolution of the form of medieval Christianity would be almost inexplicable. And in so far as the modern Catholic system is a legitimate development of medieval Catholicism, of this too Gregory may not unreasonably be termed the Father. Almost all the leading principles of the Catholicism are found, at any rate in elementary principals in Gregory the Great. He is honoured as a Doctor of the Church.

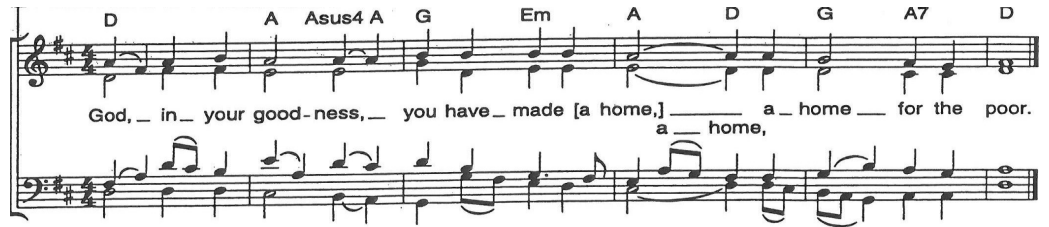
