We get what we deserve.

We have all heard the sayings, 'We get what we deserve'; 'what goes around comes around'; 'as you sow so shall you reap'. With these in mind, we know with whom to identify in the Sunday's gospel about the rich man and Lazarus.

The Gospel describes 'a man who is rich, wears purple garments and fine linen, and dines sumptuously.' Who of us would not want to be that person? Yet, I think none of us who hears this parable identifies with the rich man, but with the poor man Lazarus who hardly presents so attractive a person. He is poor, starving, and covered with sores that dogs lick. How much more uninviting can the description get? Why is it we identify with Lazarus and not with the rich man? This defies common sense! But it does make sense to us for we know that this parable is really about eternal life. We know that we get what we deserve.

The rich man's problem is not his wealth, but he is unconcerned for Lazarus. The chasm which separated the rich man and Lazarus after death is already present while they are living. This chasm – much more than the breach between rich and poor – is a gulf of uncaring. In this life the rich man could have chosen to act differently and the chasm could be bridged. Once we enter the next life, the chasm is unbridgeable.

The parable of the rich man and Lazarus is blunt: how the rich man spends the afterlife was determined in this life by his lack of concern for the poor man lying at his door.' *Now* id the time to bridge whatever chasms exist between ourselves and those in need. After death the divide is impassable, and our eternity is set.

The problem is not that we do not know how to live our lives. The problem is, we tend to talk about the poor and those in need of our care globally and in abstract terms. In this gospel, the poor and needy one is presented as an individual with a name lying at a doorstep. Jesus teaches us how to see those in need around us and reach out in concern.

So *now* is our time: Who is lying at our door?

SOCIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY

This year, Australia's Catholic bishops are urging Australians to confront the challenge of world poverty.

In confronting that challenge, we need to acknowledge the undoubted successes of the Millennium Development Goals campaign. For example, as the Statement points out, the proportion of people in the world living in extreme poverty has been halved since 1990. That is only one of the great achievements brought about by work towards the MDGs and proves that development aid works. These achievements also call us to think hard about the

These achievements also call us to think hard about the important tasks still ahead of us. The benchmark for extreme poverty is an income of \$1.25 per day. Can we as Christians really say that is sufficient? Can we stand by while each year a quarter of a million women die in childbirth, or while malnutrition kills eight million children and confers a legacy of disease and stunted growth on hundreds of millions more? Once we have understood that the struggle against profound poverty has produced real achievements, we need to ask where the real faces of poverty are to be found today. This Statement suggests five examples of areas where the world needs to focus its effort: those who are hungriest; those most vulnerable to disasters; Indigenous peoples; those with disabilities; and those uprooted from their homelands by conflict or oppression.

Asylum Seekers Support: Many parishes and individual Catholics are encountering asylum seekers in the community. Many of them are in great need and it is wonderful that so many are reaching out in love to our sisters and brothers. As more families and individuals are placed in the community in the coming months, the need for help will increase. Apart from advocacy on issues like work rights for asylum seekers, practical help in meeting basic needs is always welcome.

What God wants of people is too difficult and demanding to do without help from Jesus and Mary, Pope Francis said. "People need to lose themselves in the contemplation of Mary's sweetness and Christ's suffering in order to receive the grace necessary to live out God's will", said in his September 12 homily. What God asks of people "is not easy to live out: Love your enemies, do good to them, lead without expecting anything in return, turn the other cheek" he said. "These are tough things, right? We with our own strength, we can't do it. We cannot do this. Only grace can do it in us," a grace that comes from contemplating Christ, he said.

FEAST DAYS OF THE WEEK

Monday, September 30 St Jerome

Born to a rich pagan family, he was converted and lived for years as a hermit in the Syrian desert. Reported to have drawn a thorn from a lion's paw, the animal stayed loyally at his side for years. A student of Saint Gregory of Nazianzen, he became Secretary to Pope Damasus I who commissioned him to revise the Latin text of the Bible. The result of his 30 year of work was the Vulgate translation, which is still in use. Recognised as a Doctor of the Church and a Father of the Church.

Tuesday, October 1 St Theresa of the Child Jesus

One of the most instantly popular saint of the 20th century, was canonized less than 30 years after her death at the age of 24. A principle reason for her appeal was her Little Way to holiness—her example of achieving sanctity, not through undertaking great deeds, but through personal devotion and dedication. Her shrine at Lisieux, France, is still one of the most popular pilgrimage sites in Europe.

Wednesday, October 2 The Holy Guardian Angels

The Gospel tells us that Lazarus 'was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham.' While not being an article of faith, it is the 'mind of the Church' that each person has a guardian angel—as St Jerome expressed it: How great the dignity of the soul, since each one has from berth an angel commissioned to guard it.'

Friday, October 4 St Francis of Assisi

Francis of Assisi turned away from his life of wealth and privilege to live with lepers, the "untouchables' of his society. He preached the idea of the sanctity of all life, becoming an advocate of animal rights and environmentalism in a time when even human life often had little value. He found joy in owing nothing, and giving everything away. St Francis captured the imagination of Catholics and non-Catholics alike by his unique simplicity, the originality of his spirit and his utter devotion to the risen Christ.
