A Ring of a Sandal

The wide range of marriage proposal styles shows the diverse creativity of people for this special event. A few months ago I saw a very different one on the Internet. It happened in Milan. The young man organised a large crowd for his girlfriend in one of the biggest squares of the city. More than a hundred people were involved for the sake of one simple question: **will you marry me?** A traditional choice is during a special dinner, better if it is in an Italian Restaurant with Italian music. The "big" question is accompanied by a ring.

In the Bible we read many love stories. Maybe the marriage proposals were not Hollywood style like today. They were traditional and straight to the point. In the history of salvation the marriage of the patriarchs was related to their descendants and future generations. This was the sign of God's covenant with Abraham and the entire humanity: *I will shower blessings on you and make your descendants as numerous as the stars of heaven and the grains of sand on the seashore (Gen 22:17).* This special promise was fulfilled in Jesus Christ the Messiah.

In one of the shortest books of the Old Testament - only four chapters, we read the interesting, easy to follow story of **Ruth**. It is an account of family loyalty. Elimelech, his wife Naomi and two sons had left their country, Bethlehem, because of a severe famine. They arrived on the Plains of Moab. In this foreign land the two sons marry two Moabite women: Orpah and Ruth. Suddenly the three men die and Naomi was left with the two daughters in law. She was sorrowful and decided to go back to her country. Naomi thanked the two women and she invited them to go back to their home. She didn't have any more sons to marry them. The line of descendants from her and her husband was finished. It meant that God hadn't fulfilled his promise through them. It seemed that Naomi and Ruth were outside God's blessing. However, Ruth was faithful to her mother in law. She left her land and followed Naomi saying: **wherever you go, I shall go, wherever you live, I shall live. Your people will be my people and your God my God**.

In Bethlehem Ruth worked and begged for her mother in law. The people recognised in this stranger a great example of charity and faithfulness. Boaz, a kinsman of Naomi's husband wanted to marry and care for this woman. However, the right of redemption was through the eldest kinsman. He chose not to marry Ruth and passed his right to Boaz with a special sign: **he took off his sandal**. This strange marriage proposal was not with a ring but with a sandal. Boaz married Ruth and they conceived a son, Jesse. Their son became the father of King David. The faithful Ruth redeemed by Boaz gave a great contribution to our salvation.

Like her, we need someone to redeem us because we are barren and not able to bear fruit by ourselves. Today's gospel tells us about a sandal and not a ring. The Baptist is the precursor and the friend of the groom. Nevertheless, he couldn't redeem us: I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. Jesus has that right for us, because, he is our Messiah and Redeemer. In the water of the Jordan a special wedding was celebrated: **the marriage between heaven and earth, divine and human**. Jesus came and we are saved for ever.

Pope's Prayer Intentions for January 2015

Universal: Peace. That those from diverse traditions and all people of good will may work together for peace.

Evangelization: Consecrated Life. That this year dedicated to consecrated life, religious men and women rediscover the joy of following Christ and strive to save the poor with zeal.

What is Required to Receive Communion

To receive Holy Communion one must be fully incorporated into the Catholic Church and be in the state of grace, that is, not conscious of being in grave sin. Anyone who is conscious of having committed a grave sin must first receive the sacrament of Reconciliation before going to Communion. Also important for those receiving Holy Communion are a spirit of reconciliation and prayer, observance of the fast prescribed by the Church, and an appropriate disposition of the body (gestures and dress) as a sign of respect for Christ.

Our Lady of Fatima Requests

In her final appearance Our Lady identified herself as the Lady of the Rosary. Why did she repeatedly insist on the praying of the Rosary? First of all we should note that praying this devotion is much more than the automatic repetition of words. It is primarily a mental prayer. 
